The debate, actions, and attitudes that surround New Zealand's legislative response to smallpox also highlights the influence that the British "homeland" continued to have on the colony and its people. This essay will attempt to portray that influence by considering the actions and attitudes surrounding the 1863 and 1871 New Zealand Vaccination Acts as a legislative response to smallpox. First, I will discuss the British influence on New Zealand's response to smallpox, particularly its legislative response. Second, I will discuss the British influence on the response to New Zealand's smallpox legislation, and I will consider both anti-vaccinationist and pro-vaccinationist arguments.
