



The 39th US General Hospital Auckland WW 2 and Some of the doctors who worked there

1940 Yale and US War Dept agreed to organise a General Hospital (39th)

1940 Aug Meeting of doctors to volunteer for "Yale Unit"

1942 July Unit ordered to mobilise

1942 Oct 1 Set out



1942 Nov 22 Arrived in Auckland NZ

1942 Arrangements were being made in NZ


1942 June American Command requested survey NE Cornwall Park

1942 Oct Under emergency wartime regulations 65 acres of Cornwall Park was handed over to the 39th General US Army Hospital to house soldiers recovering from the war in the Pacific.


Plan was for 1,000 bed hospital ->1500 before opening

48 wards interconnected by covered ways ~ 800 metres long

1942 Oct Foundation stone for hospital laid



1943 Feb 7 Hospital opened



164 army patients transferred from Naval (Mob4)hospital at Hobson, Auckland







Rapport between U.S. medical personnel and their New Zealand counterparts was excellent.

On numerous occasions, American servicemen were admitted to civilian hospitals and placed under the care of staff physicians.

To the great appreciation of the Auckland Hospital Board, seven medical officers served the staff of Auckland City Hospital for about 3 months to help alleviate the shortage of civilian physicians while the 39th General Hospital was awaiting construction of its buildings.



At a meeting of the Auckland Division of BMA on 4 Nov 1942 Douglas Robb drew attention to the presence of US doctors in Auckland at the US Naval Hospital at Hobson and the 39th Army General (under construction). Many were leaders in practice and research back in the USA but as yet not fully occupied.

He suggested invoking the help of the American visitors to arrange a three-day course in general medicine and surgery with the hope that this would be the fore-runner of a permanent centre for postgraduate medical education in New Zealand.



A post-graduate medical committee was set up

3 day course Easter 1943 (April)

Other 1-3 day courses followed

US Doctors attended and contributed to monthly BMA clinical meetings

Post-graduate medical education in Auckland thereafter increased and flourished
